

THE BRITANNIA BRIDGE - In the list of names of gentlemen who have been engaged on the great tubular bridge since 1847, Mr. J. Greaves is said to have been the general manager of the masonry; we are requested to state that Mr. **Thomas Ellis Rawlinson** has been chief inspector of masonry under Mr. Frank Foster, since a short period after the first commencement of the work up this time.

METROPOLITAN GOSSIP - ...A blue-book of somewhat local interest in Liverpool, from its authorship, and which ought to be of great analogous value there from its contents, is the elaborate report of Mr. Rawlinson on the sanatory [sic] condition of Birmingham - the most curious as well as instructive document bearing on the universally-important question of the health of towns yet published. ... While speaking of the individual who planned and executed the "turned ceiling" in St. George's-hall, and which the architectural people here regard as such a phenomenon, it may not be irrelevant to add that his brother is the Mr. Thomas Ellis Rawlinson whose name you see mentioned in connexion with the stupendous operations at the Menai Strait this week. He has had charge of the masonry of the bridge, the company having built him a cottage on the Anglesey side of the works, called Britannia-lodge, where Sir F. B. Head has been staying with him.



[A very interesting story unfolds at this point. The 'Mr. Rawlinson' referred above, was (Sir) Robert Rawlinson (1810-1898). He was an English engineer who later became President of the Institution of Civil Engineers (May 1894 – May 1895). The Lancashire Evening Post on Wednesday 1 June 1898 reported: "DEATH OF SIR ROBERT RAWLINSON, K.C.B. DISTINGUISHED CHORLEY ENGINEER. Sir Robert Rawlinson. K.C.B., the sanitary engineer, died yesterday afternoon in his 89th year at his residence in London. Deceased, who was born at Chorley, was a sanitary engineer. Commissioner of The British Army in the Crimea, and Chief Engineer Inspector of the Local Government Board. The death occurred yesterday of Sir Robert Rawlinson. K.C.B., at his residence in London, 11 The Boltons, South Kensington, in his 89th year. Sir Robert was the son of Mr. Thos.

Rawlinson, of Chorley, a mason and builder, and learned the practical part the business in that town, subsequently entering the Liverpool Dock Engineer's office. Five years later, i.e., in 1836, he was at work on the Blisworth contract under Robert Stephenson. C.E., returning to Liverpool on the completion that section of the railway. In 1847, after being engineer for the Bridgwater Canal, he devised a scheme to supply Liverpool with 60 million gallons of water per day from North Wales, but the idea was considered too grand. Eleven years later he was appointed one of the first superintendent inspectors under the Public Health Act, and as the father of modern engineering sanitary science he made the first inspection and wrote the first report. His most important work was devising, executing, and establishing a new system of main sewering, which is accepted and acted upon in all parts the civilised world. In the spring of 1855 he was sent as Engineering Sanitary Commissioner to the British army in the East, and, at the camp in the Crimea, was engaged in such works as cleansing, ventilating, and furnishing purer water, with the result that by the end of the summer the army was placed in a better state of health and had a lower rate of mortality than it had ever experienced in barracks at home. The methods used in the Crimea have since been adhered to, and the average mortality in the army has been reduced about one-half. Sir Robert received thanks for his services and reports from the Secretary of the Sanitary Commission of North America at the conclusion of the Civil War, from the Emperor of Germany, Prince Bismarck, and Count Moltke. At the time of the cotton famine he supervised the carrying out of works in 93 towns and places simultaneously in the distressed districts. During his lifetime he served on several Royal Commissions, and was a member of the Army Sanitary Committee. He was decorated with the Civil Companionship of the Bath in 1865, was knighted in 1883, and on his retirement in 1889 he, at the recommendation of Lord Salisbury, received the decoration of K.C.B." The further references below clearly show the relationship between Sir Robert and Thomas Ellis – brothers: - PRS].
