The *Manchester Evening News* on Tuesday 27 July **1915** announced his death:

NONAGENARIAN CLERGYMAN'S DEATH.

The **Rev. Hugh Hornby Birley (formerly** rector of Cranfield, Bedfordshire), second son of the late Mr. Hugh Hornby Birley, of this city, died yesterday at his home, Spring Bank, Pendleton. **Mr. Birley**, who was in his 90th year, graduated at Oxford in 1849, and was ordained deacon by the Bishop of Exeter the following year; He took priest's orders in 1852, and during his active ministry, which terminated in 1892, he held a number of assistant curacies both before and after holding the living of Cranfield.

The service in the church was fully choral, and the officiating clergyman was the Vicar of Worsley, the Rev. C. B. Hulton.

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Hugh Hornby BIRLEY - Sen. (1778 - 1845)



There were 3 members of the family with the name Hugh Hornby Birley. The reverend was the second son of Hugh Hornby Birley. The third one with that name was the nephew of the reverend.

Born at Broom House, Rusholme, <u>Hugh Hornby BIRLEY</u> - Sen. was a leading Manchester millowner and Tory, who developed a reputation an industrialist with reactionary political opinions. He is reputed to have led the fatal charge of the Manchester and Salford Yeomanry Cavalry at the '*Peterloo Massacre*' on **16 August 1819**. The Yeomanry was made up of local businessmen, and were used to deal with social unrest. For example, Birley had earlier used the Yeomanry to disperse weavers marching from Manchester to Ashton-under-Lyne. A great deal has been written about him and his rôle on St. Peter's Field.

Hugh Birley continued to live in Manchester after the Peterloo Massacre. Although deeply hated by the reformers, Burley was held in high esteem by conservatives and eventually became Manchester's first President of the Chamber of Commerce. In the early 1820s Birley went into partnership with Charles Macintosh, who patented the idea of water-proofing.

Hugh's brother, Joseph Birley (1782–1847), was the father of Hugh Birley who served as Member of Parliament for Manchester from 1868 to 1883

In 1814 he commenced the building of the Cambridge Street Cotton Mill in Chorlton-on-Medlock. He was a local magistrate and at one point a Deputy Lieutenant.

He assisted the Swiss inventor-engineer Johann Georg Bodmer by making space available to him at his Chorlton Mills and was instrumental in founding the Royal Victoria Gallery of Practical Science in 1839. He was associated with the Royal Manchester Institution and a moving force in the establishment of Owens College. He was a director of the Manchester Gas Works and became a business associate of Charles Macintosh with the intention of putting the works' waste products to profitable use in the manufacture of waterproof fabrics.

He died in Eccles in 1845. **Hugh Hornby Birley** was buried in the family vault in St. Peter's Church, Manchester.
