

Curate of St. John, Pendlebury.

1878: Birth of their son John Bernard Baynes on 19 September **1878**. Baptised at St. John the Evangelist, Pendlebury, on 27 October 1878 by his father, curate of the parish.

1879-1882:

Curate of St. Mark, Worsley.

1880: The **Rev. W. H. Baynes** led the funeral service for his father-in-law, Joseph Shipton, at Barlow, Derbys., on 29 April. [Joseph Shipton had been a distinguished citizen of Chesterfield and a Town Councillor for many years and twice the Mayor. At the graveside, it was reported that Rev. Baynes was '*much moved throughout, and not a few tears were shed when the final words fell from the clergyman's lips'*. Joseph Shipton was a solicitor in the town, devoting most of his time as clerk to the county magistrates].

The **Rev. W. H. Baynes**, curate of St. Mark's, Worsley, who has been appointed vicar of Warton, near Kirkham, [patrons, the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford] was a student of Wadham College, Oxford, and obtained his B.A. degree in 1868 and M.A. in 1871. He was ordained deacon in 1869, priest in the following year by the Bishop of Chester. From 1869 to 1872 he was curate of Tintwistle; from 1872 to 1773 curate of Chesterfield with charge of Calow and the Derby-road mission; from 1873 to 1877 chaplain to the forces at Hong Kong and chaplain of St. Peter's Seamen's Church ; and from 1877 to 1879 curate of St. John's, whence he was removed to Worsley.

1883: On Monday 12 February **1883**, both **Rev. W. H. Baynes** and Rev. J.B. Baynes performed the burial of their brother, Mr. T. H. Baynes, who had died the previous Wednesday, aged 38, at his mother's residence, Knudzen House, Blackburn.

1887: Birth of Mary Baynes, his daughter, on 5 October 1887, at Warton.

On Tuesday 20 December **1887**, the **Rev. W. H. Baynes** assisted at the funeral at St. John's, Lytham, of the late Baroness Grey de Ruthin, aged 52. She had recently died at her residence Warton Hall. The family had wished that it should be a private occasion, 'but so universally was she loved and honoured in Lytham an the surrounding neighbourhood during her lifetime, and so generals were the feelings of regret at her departure from amongst them, that the inhabitants and the public body of Lytham turned out to pay a last mark of respect and esteem to one who will be so much missed by almost everyone in the immediate neighbourhood, especially the poor and the suffering. ... The prayers at the graveside were read by **The Rev. W. H. Baynes**, who was visibly affected.'

1888: Colonies and India – 21 November 1888.

The Rev. W. H. Baynes was aboard the R.M.S. Ruapehu, New Zealand Shipping Co., from London on November 15 and Plymouth November 17 **1888**, bound for New Zealand.

Fleetwood Chronicle – Friday 23 November 1888.

WARTON, The vicar of Warton. - **The Rev. W. H. Baynes**, vicar of Warton, sailed Last week in the RM S. Ruapehu, for New Zealand. He takes this trip by medical advice, owing to failing health. During Mr. Baynes's absence the work of the parish will be conducted by the Rev. W. M. Hicks, formerly curate of St. John's, Lytham, and afterwards Dean of St. John's Cathedral, Quincey, Ills., U.S.A.

1891: Lancaster Gazette - Saturday 2 May 1891.

A dinner was held at The King's Arms in Lancaster on 27 April for Old Boys of the Royal Grammar School, Lancaster. Amongst the invitees was the **Rev. W. H. Baynes** of Kirkham. '*The pleasant gathering broke up at eleven o'clock.'*

AN ECCLESIASTICAL PRINTER.—Like the worthy vicar of Bispham, the Rev. W. H. Baynes, vicar of Warton, is an amateur compositor and printer, a hobby which he pursues with great success. In his study the rev. gentleman has a frame and several "founts' of type, with which he prints the Warton and Freckleton news in the Parish Magazine, in addition to handbills and statements announcing the affairs of the church. He is a self-taught compositor, and his printing productions are very creditable. The parishioners ought to treasure the handiwork of the respected vicar.

1893: Preston Herald - Saturday 14 October 1893.

St. Michael's Mutual Improvement Society. - On Monday night members of the above society assembled in great force in the National School to hear the opening lecture of the season, entitled "Our Insect Friends," by the **Rev. W. H. Baynes,** of Warton. The lecture, which was most interesting and instructive, was listened to with great attention by all the members present. At the conclusion of the lecture, a hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the rev. gentleman for having come so far and having taken much time in preparing his lecture. There are now more members in the society than there has been hitherto, and it expected that more will join, so that there is every prospect of a most successful season.

1896: *Whitby Gazette* – Friday 19 June **1896.**

A confirmation service was held at St. Oswald's, Lythe, on Tuesday afternoon on the 16th. The Bishop of Hull officiated and was assisted by the Marquis of Normanby (formerly Earl Mulgrave) and the Rev. Robert Harland. Within the congregation were the **Rev. W. H. Baynes**, the Rev. H. R. Hopwood and the Rev. W. G. Harland – very much a reunion of former St. Mark's clergy, 5 in total, all of whom served under Mulgrave himself.

1897: Blackpool Gazette – Friday 15 October 1897.

I am pleased to hear of the success of Mr. John Bernard Baynes, a Rossall School scholar, who has gained the Bishop Lee scholarship at trinity College, Cambridge, open to sons of the clergy who have worked 5 years in the Manchester Diocese. Mr. Baynes is a son of the **Rev. W. H. Baynes**, vicar of Warton, where the successful student has earned general esteem for his labours for the promotion of football and cricket.

1908: Manchester Courier – Tuesday 18 August 1908.

The **Rev. W. H. Baynes**, who has been the vicar of Warton, near Lytham, for the past twenty-six years, was presented on Saturday with a cheque for £56 1s., as a token of the goodwill and esteem of his parishioners and many friends at Lytham. For health reasons

Mr. Baynes is leaving Warton, and is taking up the duties of the vicariate of Wolforton, *Hereford*.

Preston Herald – Saturday 22 August 1908.

A pleasant surprise was store for the **Rev. W. H. Baynes** and Mrs. Baynes, who have laboured for years indefatigably for the church and schools, and who are about to leave the parish. The parishioners and friends had spontaneously collected among themselves, and on their behalf Mr. Wykeham Clifton presented **Mr. Baynes** with a cheque for £56 1s and Mrs. Baynes with a silver jam dish. Mr. Clifton said that all classes had great affection for **Mr. Baynes** for the good work he had done. Mr. Baynes was going to leave them, and they all hoped that in the future brilliant success would crown his efforts in the holy work in which was engaged.

Mr. Baynes feelingly responded, and concluded by thanking Mr. and Mrs. Moorhouse for the use of those beautiful grounds for that afternoon's function.

Mr. Moorhouse briefly replied to the remarks of *Mr. Baynes*, and said that the value of the cheque had been made up by the parishioners and a few friends in Lytham.

The new school extensions, on behalf of which the garden party was held, will cost £900, and towards this £250 is now in the bank.

On the 26 October, **Rev. Baynes** was inducted to the rectory of Winforton, in the diocese of Hereford, by the Rev. C. S. Palmer, Canon of Hereford, acting in the place of the Ven. the Hon. B. L. S. Stanhope, Archdeacon of Hereford, the special service for induction being used.




