

CONSECRATION OF BURIAL GROUND AT STEPHEN'S, KEARSLEY.

Yesterday afternoon the Right Rev. Dr. Fraser, Lord Bishop of Manchester, attended St. Stephen's Church, Kearsley, to consecrate a plot of ground on the south side of the church as a burial ground. Up to this time Kearsley has been without a Church burial ground and interments in that communion have consequently had to be made in the adjoining township. The plot of land now set aside for the use of the parishioners was originally given by the father of Le Gendre Starkie, Esq., for the site of a vicarage, but it was not found suitable for that purpose, and another more eligible plot ground was provided by the liberality of Mrs. Blair and the present vicarage erected upon it. The ground has been surveyed and a plan made, and this with the legal charges and levelling and draining the ground, has left debt on the undertaking of about £15. Soon after three

o'clock the Bishop arrived on the ground attended the following clergymen: ... inc. the **Rev. Charles Lowe,** Incumbent of St. Stephen's.

1881: The Vicariate of Holy Trinity, Bolton, was offered to the **Rev. Charles Lowe** by the Bishop of Manchester and accepted. The *Bolton Chronicle* said *that "Mr. Lowe has laboured most assiduously in Kearsley parish, and his departure to another sphere of labour will be much regretted by the residents of Kearsley generally."* He was inducted on Tuesday 3 May.

Holy Trinity Church, Bolton.—During the time (two and a half years) since the present vicar (the **Rev. Charles Lowe, M.A.**) has had charge of the above important parish many improvements have been effected connection with Holy Trinity Church. The church itself has been redecorated throughout, the funds for which were provided by the beneficence of lady residing the parish, daily services been established, and system of district visiting has been organised. The whole of the sittings in the galleries have been made free, and new gates, with handsome stone pillars, have been erected at two entrances to the churchyard. In order to meet the loss which would result to the benefice by abolishing the pew rents in the galleries, it has been decided raise a fund of £600 towards which about £400 has already been subscribed. To meet the deficiency, as well as for providing the now gates and raising a sum towards the curate's stipend, a sale of work is to be held within a fortnight in the schools in connection with Holy Trinity Church. The Hon. Algernon Egerton, M.P., has kindly consented to perform the opening ceremony, and the Lord Bishop of the diocese has written to the vicar thoroughly approving the freeing of the galleries, towards which he has also kindly sent a donation. It is felt that the abovenamed objects are well deserving of generous sympathy, and is to be hoped they will not only receive hearty support from the parishioners themselves, but also from the public generally of Bolton and neighbourhood.

ST. JOHN'S, CHEETHAM. - It is stated that the Bishop of Manchester has offered to the **Rev. Charles Lowe,** M.A., vicar of Holy Trinity Church, Bolton, the rectory of St. John's, Cheetham, Manchester, void by the preferment of the Rev. St. Vincent Beechey to the rectory of Holy Trinity Church, Bolton-le-Sands. There is very little difference between the stipend of Holy Trinity Church and that of St. John's, Cheetham, but the population of the latter parish is about half that of which **Mr. Lowe** now has charge. Mr. Lowe. we may state, has been vicar of Holy Trinity since May, **1881**, on resigning his position of vicar of St. Stephen's Church, Kearsley Moor, which he had held since that church was consecrated on the 1st July, **1871**. Prior to that time, namely, from 1866, **Mr. Lowe** was curate of St. Mark's, Worsley, under the vicariate of the Rev. St. Vincent Beechey, father of the rev. gentleman whom he is now asked to succeed at Cheetham, Manchester. During his 10 years at Kearsley, **Mr. Lowe** made many friends, and gathered round him a large band of willing helpers in Church work, particularly from the mining population. He has-been equally successful during the nine years he has had charge of Holy Trinity Church.

[The congregation at Holy Trinity promoted a testimonial in recognition of the **Rev. Lowe's** service to the church; but he expressed the wish that the monies raised should be devoted to a renovation of the Baptismal font at the church. He took up his new position in May

Manchester Courier – Saturday 16 August **1890**: A handsome new font of Caen stone on marble pillars and beautifully carved, was placed in the church in commemoration of the nine years' incumbency of the former vicar, the **Rev. Charles Lowe**, now Rector of St. John's, Cheetham].

The **Rev. Charles Lowe,** Rector of St. John, Cheetham, and Rural Dean, has been appointed an honorary canon of Manchester Cathedral in succession to the Rev. Philip Bartlett, Vicar of Christ Church, Lancaster, resigned.

Canon Lowe - Many of the older residents of Stamford will be pleased to know that the Rev. Charles Lowe, Hon. Canon of Manchester Cathedral, who will shortly leave the parish of St. John's, Cheetham, for West Coker, Somersetshire, has by hard work and a genial disposition won the gratitude and goodwill of the people the North. Mr. Lowe was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge, at the time when several Stamford men were reading for University degrees, and all honourably distinguished themselves in different ways. As a Rifle Volunteer Mr. Lowe worked his way up from the ranks. In '59, the first year of the movement, he joined, as a private, the 5th Lincolnshire (Stamford) under Colonel Cautley, an old Indian officer. After five years or so, when he went up to Cambridge, he joined the University Volunteers. In 1881, being the Vicar of Holy. Trinity, Bolton, he took up the position of chaplain to the 2nd Vol. Batt. Loyal North Lancashire, an appointment he held until his removal to St. John's, Cheetham, in 1890, he was transferred to the 2nd Vol. Batt. Manchester Regiment. Canon Lowe was an early recipient of tile Volunteer long-service medal. "His departure," says the Volunteer specialist of a North Country daily contemporary, "will be regretted by officers and men of the battalion, by whom his services have been highly appreciated."

DEATH OF THE REV. CANON LOWE. The death is announced of the Rev. Charles Lowe, an honorary canon of Manchester and for some time rector of the parish of St. John the Evangelist's, Cheetham. After his ordination in 1866, Mr. Lowe was for several years curate St. Mark's, Worsley, and in 1871 he was in succession appointed vicar of St. Stephen's, Kearsley Moor, and of Holy Trinity, Bolton. He left Bolton in 1890, and became the rector of St. John's, Cheetham, where he stayed until 1898, when he was appointed rector of West Coker, Yeovil. There he died, after a very short illness, on Saturday. Mr. Lowe did much useful church work in Southeast Lancashire. He was the organiser. While he was rector of St. John's Church the parish schools were rebuilt and enlarged and improvements were made in the church building. He was also for a number of years the chaplain to the 2nd Volunteer Battalion the Manchester Regiment, and went with the battalion into camp. His death

was announced at morning service yesterday by the Rector of St. John's (the Rev. H. E. Alderson), who spoke of the fine service done for the church by **Mr. Lowe.** A message of condolence with the family was sent by the Rector and congregation.

REV. C. G. W. LOWE. HINTON ST. GEORGE FUNERAL. A large gathering, including representatives of Blundell's School, Tiverton, where he had occupied the position of junior house master, attended the funeral of the **Rev. Charles Grafton Lowe**, son of the late Canon Lowe, of West Coker and Manchester, and of Mrs. Lowe, of Hinton St. George, which took place at St.. George's Church, Hinton St. George. The officiating clergymen were the Revs. F. Shelmerdine (Rector), F. Grandlund (senior Chaplain Blundell's School), and L. S. Milford Bullin, of Tiverton. The body was enclosed in a coffin of panelled and moulded oak, fitted with oxidised furniture, and dull polished. The inscription on the breast-plate was: "Charles Grafton Worsley Lowe; born Nov. 12th, 1869; died Jan. 8th, 1929." The chief mourners were Miss L. A. Lowe, Miss D. Lowe, Mr. H. A. Lowe, the Rev Mr. and Mrs. Milford, Miss Joyce Milford, and Miss Hodder.

Among others present were the Headmaster of Blundell's School (Mr. H. H. Batterbee), Mr. and Mrs. Paddison, the Rev. F. Percival, Col. F. Hutchinson, Messrs. H. Marriott, O. C. Riddell, F. Morland, and G. H. Horsey, Miss S. Track, Mrs. T. R. G. Laurence, Mrs. Ashford, and Miss Dunell. A profusion of floral tributes included tokens in affectionate remembrance from the Old Blundellian Club and from Blundell's School.

REV. C. G. LOWE. Former Blunder's Master Dies at Hinton St. George. The funeral took place at Hinton St. George, Friday, of **Rev. Charles Grafton Lowe**, who was for many years a master at Blundell's School at Tiverton, before he was compelled to retire by failing health. Deceased was 59 years of age, and the son of the late Canon Lowe, of West Coker, near Yeovil, and of Mrs. Lowe, of Hinton St. George. He spent the early years of his life in the busy towns of Lancashire, being educated at Shrewsbury and Cambridge. He took his first assistant mastership at Oswestry, when in due course he was ordained. After ten years at that school he accepted the position of junior house master at Blundell's School, retiring in 1925.

He had a wonderful influence with the boys, and his interest in their careers did not end with their school days. During the war he took on the task of keeping the old boys at the front in touch with their school. played the leading part in the improvement of the school chapel at Blundell's, both as regards services and the enlargement of the building, and his greatest sacrifice caused by his illness was the giving up of his work in connection with the chapel. He went to live at Hinton St. George last September. Henry St. Alban Lowe: born 1875 - died 9 March 1943, Henley-on-Thames.

DURHAM UNIVERSITY LOSS. Death of Dr. Lowe.

The death occurred with distressing suddenness at Durham to-day of Lieut.-Col. William Douglas Lowe, who was for time in the 18th Battalion of the Durham Light Infantry, which served in Egypt and France during the war. The deceased gentleman was on the Wear yesterday afternoon coaching the University crew, and was in his customary place in the University College Chapel this morning. There, however, he collapsed and was removed to the Senate room, where he died within an hour.


Born in 1879, he was educated at Shrewsbury and Pembroke College, Cambridge. Dr. Lowe arrived in Durham in 1903 as junior censor at the University, and occupied that position until the death Mr. W. K. Hilton in 1913, when he became bursar and censor of University College. He was appointed lecturer in classics before the war, soon after the outbreak of which he was commissioned to the 18th D.L.1., of which he rose to the position of commanding officer. For his services with the battalion he was granted the D.S.O. and the M.C., and was twice mentioned in dispatches. In 1919 he returned to his duties at the University, As an oarsman Col.
