1890: *Manchester Courier* – 17 March **1890**

Death of Mr. James Bowers, of Manchester — Our Chester correspondent announces the death at Torquay, where he was staying for the benefit of his health of Mr. **James Bowers**, of Warren Hall, Broughton, Chester, and late member of the firm of Rylands and Co., wholesale manufacturers, of Manchester and district. Mr. **James Bowers** bought Warren Hall 20 years ago, and of late years had in the intervals of business successfully devoted himself to the rearing of fat stock. For some years past he had been a successful exhibitor at the Christmas auction marts at Chester. **Mr. Bowers** was in his 72nd year.

DEATH OF MR. BOWERS, OF WARREN HALL.

Mr Bowers, who was 72 years of age, died at Torquay, on Friday. The deceased gentleman was deservedly popular among all classes in the district, and the poor of the neighbourhood will long remember his kindly thought on their behalf. In manner he was very unassuming, but his many deeds of kindness to his poorer brethren will never be thoroughly realised. He was a great enthusiast in agricultural pursuits, in many branches of which he was regarded as an expert. Fat stock rearing seemed to be his favourite pursuit, and his exhibitions in the past few years at the Chester sales have been conspicuous. He was highly respected in the neighbourhood. He was thrice married, Mr. James Bowers, Mr Percy Bowers, and a daughter being issue. Mr. Bowers was a selfmade man, having formerly been a Lancashire cotton manufacturer, and has acted as a Guardian of the poor in the Hawarden Union. Much sympathy is expressed for his widow and family.

BROUGHTON. Death of Mr. J. Bowers, Warren Hall.—It is with regret that we record the death of Mr. James Bowers, of Warren Hall, Broughton, which occurred on Friday week rather suddenly at Torquay. The late Mr. Bowers, who has resided at The Warren for the past twenty years or so, was formerly a Lancashire manufacturer, but latterly retired from business entirely, and devoted his time exclusively to agriculture, in several branches of which he was both an enthusiast and an expert. Fat stock rearing proved to be his forte, his exhibits for the past few years at the Chester Christmas Sale having been so conspicuously successful that he retired last Christmas in order to let the other competitors have a look in. Horse breeding also claimed a considerable share of his attention, although in this department be never figured as an exhibitor. The poor of the district around Broughton will doubtless mourn the loss of their benevolent neighbour as much as anyone, for a more liberal giver to all charitable and worthy objects was not to be found for many miles around. The deceased gentleman was 72 years of age. The remains of the late Mr. James Bowers were interred at Worsley Parish Church on Wednesday last. A special train left Broughton Station at 11 15, arriving at Worsley at 12 45. A great many friends of the deceased met the train, which contained Mr. James

Bowers and Rev. Percy Bowers (sons), Mr. Peter Cowlie, Mr. W. Johnson, Mr. Collings, Rev. Mr. Jones, Miss Jones. The service was conducted by Rev. the Earl of Mulgrave and Rev. Stephen Gladstone, and was full choral. The psalms and hymns were impressively rendered. The popularity of the deceased was very marked. In the church a very large congregation assembled, the sacred building being quite full, and many were the expressions of sorrow and regret at the loss of such a good friend. The coffin was of polished oak, handsomely mounted with brass, and entirely covered with floral wreaths and crosses. Amongst the large number were the following:— The family of the deceased, servants of Warren Hall, the work people of Swinton Mills, the congregation of St Barnabas, Openshaw, the choir of St. Barnabas, Sunday school teachers of Openshaw, Mi«s Jones, Mr. W. Johnson, Mr. Collings, Mr. and Mrs. Goodier, the Misses Kershaw, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Dixon, Mr. Cunnah, and many others. The funeral arrangements were efficiently carried out by Messrs Brown, Holmes and Co., of Chester.

The will of Mr. James Bowers, of the Warren, Hawarden, late partner in the firm Rylands and Co., of Manchester, has been proved in the St. Asaph Probate Court. The gross value of the estate has been sworn £39,115. The executors are Mrs. Bowers, to whom the deceased has bequeathed his freehold estate for her life; the Rev. Percy H. Bowers, son: and Mr. William Thomas Dunn.

Examples of The Philanthropy of the BOWERS Family (1878 – 1882).

The Manchester Courier

On Tuesday 21 October **1879**, it reported that the church of St. Barnabas, Openshaw, held its it anniversary sermons on the previous Sunday (19th). The day and Sunday schools, which are well attended, took part. The children of the newly built infant school (250 in number) were also present. The school had been built at the sole expense of **Mrs. James Bowers** (of the firm of George Whyatt's, dyers).

Monday 17 November **1879**: The FOUNDATION STONE OF ST. CLEMENT'S CHURCH, HIGHER OPENSHAW. On Saturday afternoon the foundation stone of St. Clement's Church, Higher Openshaw, was laid by **Mrs. James Bowers**, of Warren Hall, Chester, in the presence of a large gathering of Sunday-school scholars and friends. Processions were formed by the teachers and scholars connected with St. Barnabaa'a, Openshaw, and St. Mary's, Droyleden, at their respective schools. ...

... **Mr. James Bowers**, on behalf of Mrs. Bowers, briefly addressed the assembly, expressing the pleasure it gave him and his wife to be associated with that ceremony. He added that he would make the church a present of a very handsome pulpit and a reading desk - (hear, hear, and applause) - and as Mr. Dickinson had stated that they were a few hundred pounds short, he would increase his donation to £500. (Applause.)

Monday 7 June **1880**: It was reported that St. Barnabas, Openshaw, had recently undergone considerable changes in its internal arrangements. ... These alterations were carried out 'through the liberality of **Mr. Bowers**. ... The entire cost of the alterations has been borne by **Mr. James Bowers**, of Openshaw, and Warren Hall, near Chester.' The Bishop of Manchester presided at the ceremony and preached from the new lectern provided by **Mr. Bowers**.

Saturday 22 January **1881**: BROUGHTON. Treat to the Aged Poor. — The other day **Mr. James Bowers**, the Warren, Broughton, gave his annual treat to the aged poor men and women of Broughton. It took the form of a knife and fork tea, and consisted of tea, bread and butter, ham, roast beef, pork pies, currant cake, and seed cake *ad lib*. About sixty sat down, and were waited on.
