1897: *Sheffield Daily Telegraph* - Thursday 22 July 1897.

In a very short time the long boat-shaped valleys which are now mingled moorland and pasture will be alive with men converting these lone lands into lakes for the needs of Sheffield's people. Several thousands of navvies will be employed on the new reservoirs; and the Water Committee, taking thought for their workers, have decided to employ the services of the **Navy Mission Society** while the work is going on. This constitutes a strong claim for local help to the Society, and Archdeacon Eyre is anxious to bring it home to Sheffield Church folks generally. He has therefore arranged for special sermons on behalf of the Society next Sunday at the Parish Church, by the **Rev. Ernest V. Everard**, M.A., the Chaplain of the Mission.

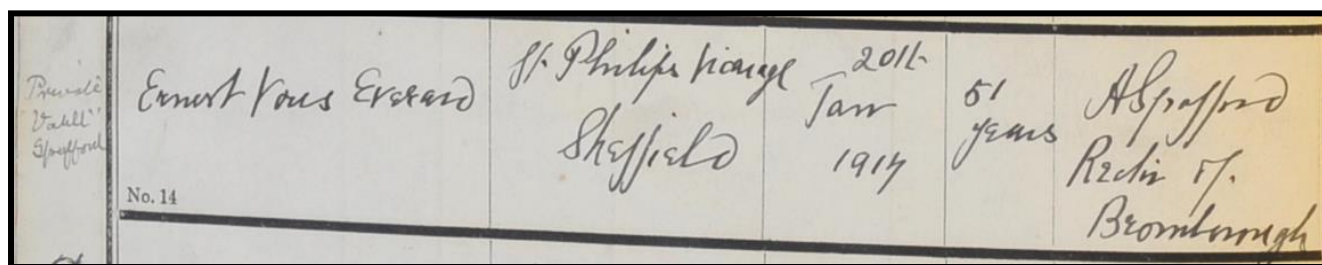
GREAT MISSION.
WHY CHURCHES ARE NOT FILLED.
SHEFFIELD SERVICES.

Every effort has been made in St. Philip's, Sheffield, to ensure that the great mission which is proceeding in the city shall be a success, and there are unmistakable signs, other than the large attendances the services, that there is a spiritual awakening in the parish.

The Vicar (the **Rev. Ernest V. Everard**), the missionary (the Rev. H. P. Hiscoke, of Preston), and the assistant clergy and lay-workers have left no stone unturned to arouse interest in the mission. There have been illuminated processions on each night the weather has permitted, breakfast, dinner, and tea-time services at many of the works in the district - in four cases, by the employers' permission, during working hours - and a large number of services at the church, at which the attendance has been most encouraging, especially at the children's services.

In the course of earnest sermon last night, the missionary asked why churches were not filled nowadays, why the Church seemed to have such little power? He believed it was because the Church and the individuals, who were members of it, were not filled with the Holy Spirit.

1917: Death of **Ernest Vores Everard** on 14 January **1917** at Newcastle-on-Tyne. He was buried in the Spafford Vault at St. Mark's on 20 January 1917, by the Rev. A Spafford, Rector of Bromborough [Brother-in-law].

MEMORIAL TO LATE SHEFFIELD VICAR.

*In St. Philip's Church, last night, the Bishop of Sheffield unveiled a tablet to the memory of the **Rev. Ernest V. Everard**, who was Vicar of the church from 1912-1917. The late Vicar enjoyed great popularity in the parish, especially among the poorer people, for whom he worked hard throughout his ministry. **Mr. Everard** died whilst paying a visit to his son, who was a soldier in training at Newcastle. The late Vicar collapsed and died on rising to address a meeting of soldiers in the Y.M.C.A. Hall.*

*Electric light has been installed in the chancel as a memorial to **Mr. Everard**, and a brass tablet., recording his connection with St. Philip's, has also been placed on a pillar near the altar. After unveiling the tablet, the Bishop dedicated it.*

The Bishop, in the course of his sermon, spoke of the great mission work which the late Vicar had carried on, and said it was while doing mission work that lie was called away. The Bishop thought that the form of the memorial - the lighting of the Chancel - was a fitting symbol of the work of the late Vicar, who shed the light of the Truth wherever he laboured.



‘**Ernest Vores Everard**, who since 1912 had been vicar of the large parish of St. Philip, received in the very prime of his life the Home-call with startling suddenness in January, 1917, just as he was rising to speak to an audience of soldiers at Newcastle-on-Tyne. A son of **George Everard**, the well-known mission preacher and tract-writer, he partook very largely of his father's joyous and optimistic temperament. For twelve years, 1900-12, he was Vicar of St. James's, Sheffield. Musical, bright, and cheerful, he took sunshine wherever he went. Large-hearted and, like his father, a dedicated evangelical, he was held in high esteem by a wide circle.’
