James Maurice MILNER was a Lance Corporal in The King's (Liverpool Regiment) 1st/7th Bn., service number 266338. He died on 9 April **1918**, aged 21 years old. His name is recorded on the LOOS MEMORIAL, panel 27 to 30. In detail it is on Stone 28A. He was the son of Jonathan and Grace Denson (Nightingale) Milner of 407 Liverpool Road, Birkdale, Southport.

This black broken plaque has appeared at the foot of a memorial stone, unconnected to him, but covered in ivy.

1941: Death of his father *Jonathan Milner*, on 28 March 1941, aged 69, who was buried at Birkdale. His headstone reads:

MILNER, JAMES MAURICE, L.-Corpl., No. 266338, 1/7th (Territorial) Battn. The King's (Liverpool Regt.), s. of Jonathan Milner, of 407, Liverpool Street, Southport, by his wife, Grace Denson, dau. of Alexander Nightingale, of Salford; b. Eccles, co. Lancaster, 2 Oct. 1896; educ. Worsley Church School, and Christ Church Higher Grade School, Southport; was a Dentist; joined the King's (Liverpool Regt.) 22 March, 1915; served with the Expeditionary Force in France and Flanders from 20 Aug. following, and was killed in action at Givenchy 9 April, 1918. Buried near La Plantin, west-north-west of La Bassée; *unm.*
