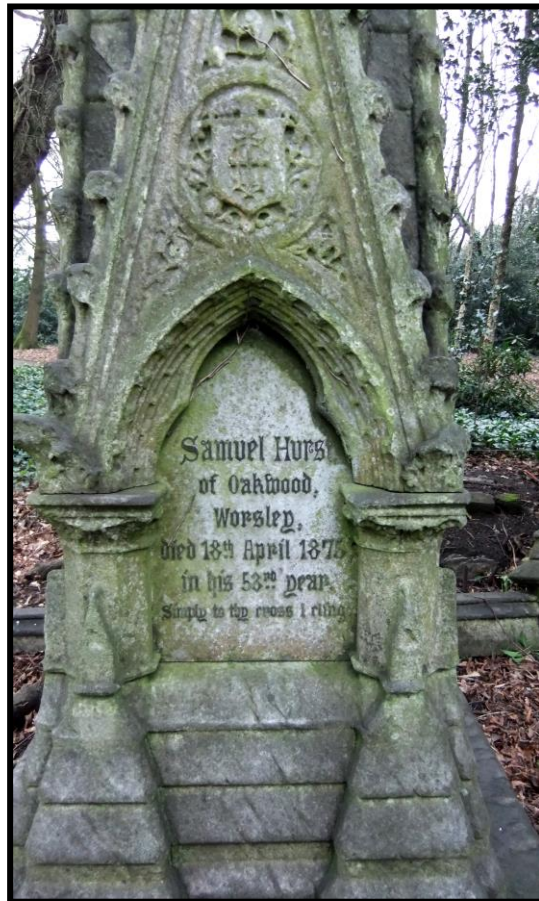

The alarm was raised and assistance having been obtained flames were quickly extinguished, but not before damage amounting to £300 had been done.

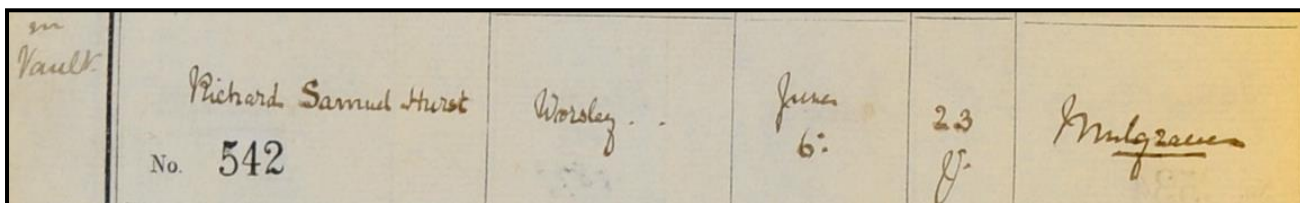

Death of Mr. Samuel Hurst, of Worsley. — The death of Mr. Samuel Hurst took place on Monday, the 19th inst., at his residence, Oakwood, Worsley. The deceased was born in 1822 at Worsley, and was therefore in the 53rd year of his age. In early life he was a working collier, and he worked in the pit along with the late Mr. Matthew Bennett, J.P., and Mr. William Crompton, one of the ex-mayors of Wigan. As illustrating the proverb, "Where there's a will there's a way," it is said that the three named, whilst following their lowly occupation one day, resolved to do something better than get coal, and on the strength of that resolve, on the very day it was formed, they each gave notice to leave. They each persevered in the several walks of life they espoused, and in course of time Mr. Bennett and Mr. Crompton became extensive colliery proprietors, and Mr. Hurst an extensive millowner, Lakefield Mills, Worsley-road, Little Hulton, belonging to him, at which place there are employed several hundreds of hands. In the pit Mr. Hurst often used his shovel as a slate upon which to work sums, and by diligence he acquired a fair acquaintance with general knowledge, and also learned the French language. When he left the coal-pit Mr. Hurst opened a school in the neighbourhood of Pendleton. In course of time he commenced to work a mill in Albert-road, Farnworth, and, business prospering, he built the large and excellent Lakefield Mills above mentioned. After the death of his wife, some years ago, Mr. Hurst went to reside at Cornbrook, near Manchester, and from thence he came to reside at Oakwood, Worsley, which mansion he built in 1870. Mr. Hurst has been distinguished for great business ability and kindness and generosity of disposition, and he will be greatly missed by many poor people whose wants he regularly attended to. He evinced great catholicity of spirit, for whilst attending New Bury Church, Farnworth, he had pews at St. Paul's Church, Walkden, at the Wesleyan Chapel, Worsley, and at Albert-road Congregational Church, Farnworth.

His death was recorded in several newspapers across the country.

1877: Death of **Richard Samuel Hurst**, aged 23 years, on 1 June **1877**, son of **Samuel**. Buried at St. Mark's on 6 June 1877.
